Eventually, special conference committees were set up within Boards, with board members and colleagues. Sue-Anne Waillace and Darani Lewers spoke about aspects of the
government supported craft/arts infrastructure, markets and
audiences for craft.
Jim Logan and Rox De Luca, spoke informatively about the National
Gallery of Australia collection and Artbank, respectively.
Ivana Jirasek outlined some of the key exhibitions of art glass and
their contribution to change and development.
Private collector Frank Howarth provided a clear and personal view of
why and what one collects. Victoria Keighery reviewed Ausglass as an
organisation considering how it might enter its next phase, advocating
maintenance of a grass-roots volunteer structure.
Warren Langley described the artist as a juggler balancing symbiotic,

Our major host with Australian Catholic University was finalised and key partnerships locked in with Craft Victoria, MADA, Garland Magazine and others. Grant applications were made. Regretfully, after the recent ongoing state border closures and tight restrictions in Melbourne, in consultation with the Melbourne Conference Committee, the Ausglass Board made the difficult decision to postpone the conference by one year, a move echoed by many similar organisations. It will now be held in Melbourne from 3-5 February 2023. Fortunately, our key partners and many of the presenters have agreed to move to the 2023 dates, so stay tuned for what promises to be a wonderful conference, even if it is not quite around the corner. One of the most valued components of the conference that we were all looking forward to was the face-to-face aspect; opportunities to catch up with friends, meet new people, to share stories and experiences, and of course, the parties!' Conference program is yet to be announced, but its content is based on ideas such as: History and Tradition: First Nations, art history, critical discourse, and Ausglass luminaries.

Following the 9 <sup>th</sup> conference in Adelaide in <b>1995</b> , the 'Heart of Glass',
Ausglass '95 Post-conference edition of Ausglass magazine, provided
the program, transcripts of lectures, and summaries of events.
In 1999 all conference papers from the conference in Wagga Wagga
were later published as 11th Biennial Ausglass Conference Papers.
Furthermore, the 2002-3 Annual Report notes that: 'This was the first
year that lecture papers were compiled and presented in a handbook
at the commencement of the conference – an initiative greatly
welcomed by delegates.' (not found)
Following the 2005 'Matters of substance' GAS conference in
Adelaide, the Glass Art Society's 2005 Journal published transcripts
and summaries of all lectures, including Australian contributions.
In 2013, following the 17th Conference in Wagga Wagga, a substantial
publication, The Collective Vision Conference Papers, was published in
print, and as the June 2013 Ausglass newsletter noted earlier: 'We're
